We work with Nemours Cleft Palate-Craniofacial Program to:


- Assess nasal speech of children with cleft palate-craniofacial disorders using special instrumentation

- Conduct research to help understand speech problems related to cleft palate-craniofacial disorders


What is nasal speech?

When we have too much air coming out of the nose when we talk.

How does nasal speech happen?

 When we talk, the soft palate closes to separate the nose from the mouth When the palate does not close, air leaks through the nose and the person sounds nasal.


